

NORTHROP GRUMMAN

- Microsoft to end support for SQL 2000 in April 2013
 - Will no longer provide updates and patches
 - Will not provide standard software support
- As of August 2012 there were 318 instances of fully licensed SQL 2000 (standard, enterprise and developer editions) in the COV environment
- As of January 2013 the SQL team has worked with agencies to reduce this to 132 instances
- As of January 2013 there are 139 instances of SQL desktop and personal editions in the COV environment



- Focus needed to expedite migration of the remaining SQL Server 2000 instances to a supported platform specifically - if you have not done so already please begin:
 - Evaluating your environment for the migration
 - Preparing a migration plan


SQL 2008 Benefits

- Increased productivity for database workloads
 - Performance enhancements throughout the technology stack to reduce the cost of managing your data
 - Improvements in the core database engine, SQL Server Analysis Services (SSAS), SQL Server Reporting Services (SSRS) and SQL Server Integration Services (SSIS)
- Trusted database platform
 - Fully supported
 - Builds on the data encryption capabilities introduced in Microsoft SQL Server 2005

SQL 2008 Benefits

- Intelligent data platform
 - Provides better management of reports and analysis of any size or complexity, and empowers users by providing powerful visualization
 - Provides better integration with Microsoft Office
