Overview

What is MITA?

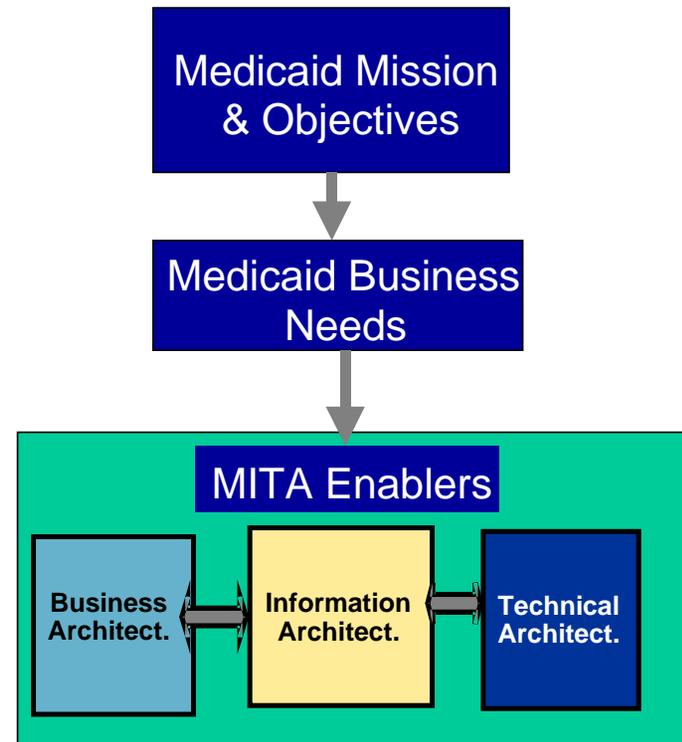
- A Centers for Medicaid & Medicaid Services (CMS) initiative to transform the Medicaid Management Information Systems (MMIS) into an enterprise-wide backbone architecture compatible of addressing tomorrow's Medicaid needs.
 - IT Architecture Framework
 - Planning Guidelines
 - Processes
- MITA is a work in progress



MITA Framework

A Business-Driven Architecture

- Vision, mission, objectives come first
- Architecture responds to business needs
- MITA Business, Information, Technical Architecture models are enablers to meet business needs



MITA Framework

What is the vision?

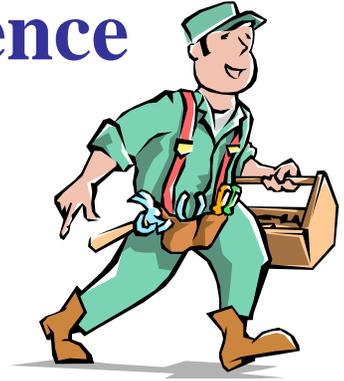
- Business Architecture component: Concept of Operations
 - A tool used to describe current business operations and to envision a future transformation that meets the needs of stakeholders as well as responds to drivers/enablers
 - COO structure calls for:
 - *Definition of As-Is operations*
 - *Identification of current stakeholders*
 - *Identification of major data exchanges among stakeholders*
 - *Listing of key enablers with an estimate of time of impact*
 - *Description of To-Be operations*
- This process requires adapting the industry COO to reflect a common vision of Medicaid's future that is shared by the States and CMS, while preserving individual State adaptations
- Sweeping changes and includes HIT: EHR/PHR/HIE

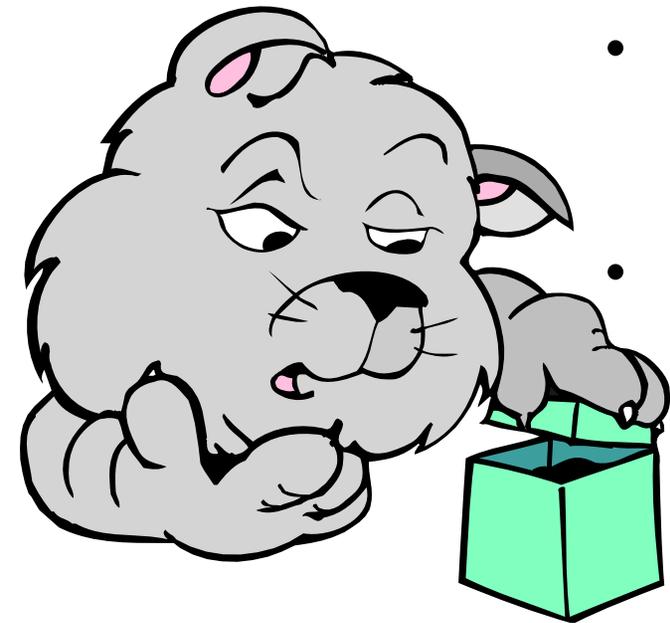
CMS Activities

- State, industry, CMS MITA workgroups established
- MITA Governance structures put in place
- Working with SAMHA on BH-MITA
- “*MITA Connection*” -- published 9 monthly newsletters since last November on MITA-specific activities at CMS and in States
- Three-quarters of States working on or completed their MITA State Self-Assessments
- Held 2-day on-site MITA Training Sessions for States in collaboration with all 10 CMS RO's

MITA's SOA Framework Useful to Others

- A Landscape document, describing current business and technical capabilities
- A Concept of Operations, describing a vision of future business operations and technology
- A Maturity Model, describing steps in a high-level roadmap that project how business and technology will change along the way
- A Business Process Model, describing current operational processes, and
- A State Self-Assessment, which uses the BPM to help States assess their current business capability levels for each business process

Leveraging MIA's Framework

- Can serve as the “Central Nervous System” for connecting H/HS programs
- Enables Medicaid claims processing and information retrieval systems to work on multiple platforms and shift focus to quality and outcomes management
- Health information will be easily accessed and shared throughout the delivery of care.



Current Direction

- American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)
 - Targeted to establishing provider EHR/HIE
 - Funding sources
 - Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC)
 - Grant program
 - CMS
 - Administered by State Medicaid offices
 - Funding to qualified providers
 - MITA funding is a separate source
 - Details forthcoming from Federal agencies
 - Many questions with few answers
- MITA and ARRA HIT provisions
 - COV strategic plan needed to leverage federal funding
